Mission Bend Crime Statistics

The following are crime statics for the Mission Bend area.

- •Mission Bend is safer than 26.5% of the cities in the nation.
- •The crime rate in Mission Bend is less than 30% of the cities in Texas.
- •The estimated chance of being a victim of a crime in Mission Bend is 1 in 31.
- •The estimated chance of

being a victim of a violent crime in Mission Bend is 1 in 303.

•The estimated chance of being a victim of a property crime in Mission Bend is 1 in 34.

This leaves the question, how can we protect ourselves? The following are a few tips; 1) trust when something doesn't seem right, 2) beware of your surroundings, 3) pay attention to the people around you, 4) act confident and focused, 5) have an escape plan, 6) stay physically fit, 7) react quickly to the danger.

Additionally, if you see a crime in progress, call 911. Help your neighbors in time of need and get to know them. If you see suspicious activity or characters in your neighborhood call the police.

Protecting Your Children

According to City-Data.com there are 65 registered sex offenders in the Mission Bend Area.

The vast majority of sexual abuse occurs with adults the child knows and comes to trust. Many times it occurs in the child's home.

It is very important for parents to talk to their children about what sexual abuse is and how they can protect themselves. It is equally important to make sure your child knows it is never their fault. By talking to your children and having open lines of communication your child will be more comfortable in coming to you if they are ever confronted with this situation.

Child advocates suggest explaining the difference

between 'good' touches -like a hug, or a pat on the back, or a kiss on the cheek; there are 'bad' touches -- like when somebody hits you or pushes you. And there are 'secret' touches -- where somebody wants to touch you and they say you have to keep it a secret.

Clerk Thwarts Robbery

Noman Ali was working the register at a Fuel Expo in Houston, Texas when a man brought some beer to the counter, drew a gun, and demanded cash. Ali handed over some money, but then retrieved a gun and fired at the criminal, striking the robber multiple times before he fled to a nearby car. As he was making his getaway, the criminal crashed his vehicle into a ditch then attempted to force at least one passerby at gunpoint to take him to a hospital. However, before anyone else could be hurt, police captured the gunman.

Ali harbors no ill will towards the criminal, telling a local media outlet, "Crime needs to be stopped and [that's] it, my goal [was] not to kill him... I'm good, the customers are good. Hopefully he's good too."


has grown into one of the largest fairs in the state of Texas.

The following is the State of Texas Law regarding littering.

Criminal Penalties (a) A person commits an offense if the person disposes or allows or permits the disposal of litter or other solid waste at a place that is not an approved solid waste site, including a place on or within 300 feet of a public highway, on a right-of-way, on other public or private

property, or into inland or coastal water of the state. ... (d) An offense under this section is a Class C misdemeanor if the litter or other solid waste to which the offense applies weighs five pounds or less or has a volume of five gallons or less. ... (i) On conviction for an offense under this section, the court shall provide to the defendant written notice that a subsequent conviction for an offense under this section may result in the forfeiture under Chapter 59, Code of Criminal Procedure, of the vehicle used by the defendant in committing the offense.
