The Community Volunteer Fire Department currently protects an estimated population of 115,000 within a geographic area of approximately 25 square miles, which includes the Greater Mission Bend Area. The area serviced is primarily residential with



some commercial. In 1954, five members of the farming and dairy community, now known as Alief and far beyond what was then the city limits of Houston, formed a voluntary association with an estimated value of \$1,500. The charter stipulated the area that was to be served was a two-mile radius of the center of Alief, an unincorporated village in Harris



County, Texas.

Years passed without a lot of change until the 1960's. As subdivisions located off of Boone Road and Kirkwood began to fill with families, it was not long before it was determined that additional fire services were needed in the area. In 1971, the City of Houston loaned the



Alief Fire Department two fire trucks and they were parked at two different service stations near Boone and Wilcrest.

In order to acquire the funds needed to build a building for the fire department, a door-to-door fund drive was held. Each resident was asked to donate \$12 per year. The initial drive raised nearly \$20,000.



A fire station was constructed on donated land near Boone and Bissonnet by volunteers working nights and weekends and opened in November of 1971.

In 1972, the Alief Volunteer Fire Department and the Community Volunteer Fire Department merged. In 1985, the name of the fire department was changed to the Community Volunteer Fire Department because the area that it served was much more than just Alief.

Today, the fire station is located at 16003 Bellaire Blvd. in a building that was constructed a few years ago with two Bays that house the fire trucks as well as ambu-



lances and other equipment.

There is also a comfortable facility for the fireman to use between runs as well as a training room.

The training room is occasionally used by several community organizations, including the Greater Mission Bend Area Council, who hold their monthly meetings as well as other events sponsored by the Council at the fire station. The firemen have even given up the bay area of the fire station for large meetings.



Even though most of us just take for granted that we can call 911 and will be taken care of; the whole community joins the GMBAC in saying

"Thanks" to Steve Fowler and his crew for their dedication and professionalism.



'Free trial' or Internet scam?

NEW YORK (CNN) -- Free trials are not always free. And in some cases, they are very expensive. The FTC, Visa and the Better Business Bureau are warning today about deceptive advertising.

You may have seen those "free trial ads" on the Internet for things like acai berry, teeth whiteners or colon cleansers. In some cases, when you click on the free trial, you may (or may not) get the product; but then -- if you don't cancel the product, or opt out -- down the road, you get charged repeatedly for products or services you haven't asked for.

According to VISA, almost 30% of online consumers have been victimized by this deceptive marketing. One company that sells acai berry supplements received more complaints this year than BBB receives about the entire airline industry in one year.

Sometimes, these free trial offers are buried inside what looks like a fake news site. These sites are all about looking official. Even the logos of big media companies -- CNN included -- are used to make this site LOOK legitimate. Below the fake news article are links to "free trials." You may see phony testimonials or consumer comments. Typically, on these Web sites, the deadline to sign up for a free trial is the next day. Often the details of the offer are buried in the terms and conditions. Legitimate companies do not bury cancellation policies or other charges.

Be cautious, don't hand over your debit or credit card number to a business you've never heard of without checking it out first with the Better Business Bureau. You can also check in with your state attorney general.

Pay attention to any pre-checked boxes before you give your credit card number. If there is a check in one of these boxes, delete it. A pre-checked box is a big red flag. Otherwise, you could be bound to terms and conditions that you don't want.

Make sure you review your credit card statements when you get them for any unauthorized charges. If you do see unusual activity or unauthorized charges, call the company and try to resolve it with them. If that doesn't work, dispute the charge with your credit card issuer.
